We hope this newsletter finds you well. As Election Day in November approaches, we want to draw your attention to two levy renewals that will be up for a vote. These levies, namely the Roads and Bridges 0.8 mil levy and the Roads and Bridges 1.0 mil levy, are for the resurfacing, repair, and maintenance of our township streets. Maintaining our township roads is a responsibility we take seriously. Over time, inflation has significantly increased the cost of materials and equipment required for road maintenance. The renewal of these levies will allow the township to continue providing the necessary resources to uphold the quality and safety of our streets.

Every year, our dedicated team of three full-time employees and two parttime summer workers strives to extend the lifespan of our township roads. Their efforts involve sealing cracks on road surfaces - the result of winter freezing temperatures. Crack sealing is a critical preventive measure that greatly enhances the longevity of our road surfaces. It not only saves money in the long run by avoiding more extensive repairs but also ensures smoother and safer driving con-

nity. We understand the financial strain that inflation has placed on households, and we are sensitive to the economic challenges many of you may be facing. That is why

the Trustees are not asking for an increase in these levies at this time. Instead, we are seeking to renew the existing 0.8 mil and 1.0 mil levies to maintain the current level of funding for our road maintenance efforts. Your vote matters, and we encourage you to participate in the Nov. 7 election. Thank you for your attention.

the community steer through the ropes of larger government is a challenge where I believe I can contribute."


From the Desk of Fire Chief Scott Hildenbrand

The deteriorating wood jungle gym was removed from the playground area several months ago to make way for the new slide structure. The slides that were removed from the old jungle gym will be attached to the newly manufactured structure. The projected installation is slated for October. New tot swings have recently been installed.

In the beginning of this year the Park Board applied for a pollinator grant through the Foundation for Geauga Parks. Using the landscape design created by The Nature Studio, along with native pollinator plants selected by Wiley Landscaping, the grant was awarded. The pollinator plants are an important part of the detention basin project which is to provide a habitat for insect pollinator species. The plant species will also help to stabilize the ground and prevent erosion. A seating area, along with information on the plants and pollinator species, will be added later as an educational resource to the community.

The Township Community picnic will be held on August 13 from 1-5 p.m. in the park. The picnic is a wonderful way for residents to come together while enjoying great food, music, and fun. The auction that is held at the end of the day always draws a crowd. Donations from local businesses and residents help make the picnic a yearly success. From the Zoning Inspector

This section usually covers items that are regulated by the Hambden Township Zoning Resolution. While the resolution covers many topics that are considered "standard," there are several common items that are not covered. For the most part, these items are not part of the resolution because of legal limitations placed on townships. In other cases, the issue may be just too specific.

For example, Hambden does not have rules pertaining to grass that hasn't been mowed. While we can regulate junk or garbage on a property, placement of lawn waste is outside of our purview. Another common call we receive is about noise complaints. The township does not have the necessary equipment to measure noise or a rule that sets unacceptable noise levels. While the resolution does cover "offensive" noise, this is rather subjective and can be difficult to enforce. Another issue that regularly comes up is water drainage.

The resolution does not cover drainage which makes these situations a matter exclusively between neighbors. Even though there are not zoning rules pertaining to these items, it's still important to consider them and the impact they may have on your neighbors and their properties.

From the Road Departmemt



A friendly reminder to all motorists: PLEASE SLOW DOWN when entering a work zone. We try our best to keep you safe on the road – please help keep us safe as well. Thank you! To all residents living on a township road, please remember that if you are going to enclose your road-

side ditch you must obtain a ditch enclosure permit from Hambden Township. Permit forms can be printed from the Hambden Township website.

You may have noticed the absence of American Flags lining our streets during the Memorial Day parade. Last year, the township received notice from the utility company that hanging anything from the utility poles is NOT permitted – with instructions to remove anything currently hanging from the poles. We discovered that a permit can be applied for to hang flags; however, due to the number of requests, it could take 12-18 months to consider and approve the permit. Hambden Township went through the lengthy process of providing the permit application and required documentation this spring. We hope to receive good news and will keep you posted with updates.

Taxes are Often a Sensitive Subject for All of Us

Many of us find Ohio's real estate tax laws and levies confusing. Often, we rely on the entities asking for the levies to tell us how much they will cost, but do you really know how levies work?

For those who do not know what a "mil" is; mil stands for millage – which is one dollar of tax revenue for every \$1,000 of assessed valuation. In Ohio we pay taxes on our assessed value which is 35% of our market value established by the Auditor's Office. If your property is valued at \$100,000 and the millage is 1, you take \$100,000 multiplied by 35% to get the assessed value. The assessed value of \$100,000 is \$35,000. 1 mil is expressed as .001. For example, $.001 \times 35,000 = 35$.

When faced with figuring levy costs people often will say "who lives in a \$100,000 house these days?" If you live in an \$80,000 house – you can turn the \$100,000 value into a multiplier (or percentage). \$80,000 is 80% of \$100,000. If you have an \$80,000 property, the levy will cost \$28 x 80% = \$22.40. Let's say you live in a \$175,000 property. \$175,000 is 175% of \$100,000. This means, 1.75 x \$28 = \$49. Now that you have read this you may be wondering why levies passed prior to 2014 cost less than levies passed

after 2014. That is due to the value of our district at the time the levy was passed as well as potential tax credits. Levies prior to 2014 were subject to reductions due to tax credits for residential and agricultural properties.

Have you ever heard the terms "rollback" for non-business properties and the Owner-Occupied Credit? Prior to 2014 levy millage was reduced by the tax credits that residential and agricultural properties receive. After 2014, those reductions no longer apply to new or replacement levies. Prior to 2014 the tax credits were reimbursed from the state to the revenue receiving entities; however, since the reimbursement from the state no longer applies, levies passed after 2014 cost the taxpayers about 12.5% more than they did pre-2014. All existing levies that were passed prior to 2014 still are reduced by the tax credits and the state

still reimburses the tax collecting entities; however, as levies expire or need to be replaced the cost of the levies is completely born by the taxpayers instead of being reduced by tax credits.
